I was then elected to be chairperson, playing a leading role with the support of very capable staff and subsequent to this the three development project offices, Northern, Southern and Western Projects were merged into one and registered as a new NGO called the West Dominica Children's Federation Inc

back in 2010. I was then elected as president of the federation by a general membership. This experience and responsibility was a huge one for me directing a new membership of more persons on the board, more community mobilizers and also a coordinator who all made the federation very effective in carrying out its objectives.

Again we saw the lives changed for families in significant ways, from school fees, transportation, medical bills, school feeding, repairs to schools and development of school libraries.

This is a journey that I can look back and see that great success was accomplished by the federation in the lives of many. And for me the satisfaction is for me to know that I was part of the group of people who assisted in this great work for the good of families, our children and Dominica as a whole.

Childfund leaving the Caribbean and Dominica in particular was a tremendous lost. However sad that lost that was experienced by all, Childfund exited but the Westfed continued through the faithful donors who wanted to see the young lives continued to be touched by Westfed. Thanks to all our donors local and regional and international.

Coordínator's Comments:



The federation then went through a transition with its sole funder which made for challenging times for us. This took some change management skills on all fronts.

Out of this came many opportunities to seek funding elsewhere for the first time. This was compounded by the natural disasters forcing the federation into recovery and rehabilitation mode. This again presented unfamiliar territory and facilitated growth and new environments and new challenges. We have however kept the lantern burning and sourcing assistance for persons and communities by leaning on the different skills and competencies of not only myself but a small support system in the persons of Vanessa Prevost and Joanne George. We have survived through consistent writing, collaborating and seeking of projects that are relevant and feasible and beneficial to the families and children that we



serve from north to south of the island. Special thanks to the board members, staff members and supporters and most importantly to our funders now and in the future.

Brief History about the organization



The West Dominica Children's Federation (West Fed) is a NGO working on behalf of children in 50 communities on the west coast of the Dominica. We serve children and families by implementing programs that target the following five priority issues: Alcohol & Drugs, Sexual Abuse, Unemployment, Climate Change Adaptation and Empowerment of Women and Girls.

Our programming approach is directed to changing the socio-economic landscape for deprived, excluded, and vulnerable children and families in Dominica.

Vision

Create an economically vibrant community by building partnerships across all sectors of the community for the good of the children.

Mission

Children and youth will reside in a caring and peaceful environment that promotes effective partnerships to ensure that they live in communities that are passionate about community empowerment.

Goals

Increase child and youth access to nurturing and stimulating experiences conducive to

healthy growth and development. Ensure children and youth have access to and complete basic good quality education. Enable meaningful youth participation in policies and programs that affect and can benefit their lives

The federations seeks to integrate programs and finance into project activities that are interesting to the children and youth and cater to the needs of the families that are Deprived Vulnerable and Excluded. We have a responsibility to the underprivileged who see us as a beacon of hope especially in times of extreme hardship. Our aim is also to ensure that we implore the highest level of meaningful participation and leadership of children and youth in schools and communities in what is happening around them.

There is considerable need for the

continuation of the work that we do. NGOs have a role to play in society that is far reaching. The ensure that persons on the breadline do not go unassisted. In difficult these economic and socially unstable period, when the vulnerable are the ones who suffer and lack the most, the work of the federation becomes even more critical.

We continue to implement and adhere to policies and guidelines for quality operations of the Federation, quality assurance of financial agreements and performance management with our funding agencies and supporters. We can do this if we conduct effective monitoring and evaluation of projects through reviews, research, surveys, beneficiary tools, and using technology to give us the competitive edge when bidding for project funding.

We strive to increase high visibility of the organization and work with private and public sector and civil society to increase financial and technical resources to ensure growth and sustainability.

Surviving the Post ChildFund Era

At some point there was an executive decision made from very high up in the hierarchy of ChildFund International to depart the Caribbean and

cease operation in the islands of Dominica and St. Vincent being the last two islands that they were operating on. The plan being to equip the federations to operate autonomously in the future years. This was well planned out and the exit strategy was rolled out.

This meant that the West Dominica Children's Federation was no longer a beneficiary of the funding provided by ChildFund Caribbean. It now had to seek funding in order to implement projects similar to what it was accustomed to doing keeping in mind the target audience as the children and youth and communities that it normally serves.

This posed both a challenge and opportunities for the federation for never before had it sought funding elsewhere and never before did it have the capacity to do that. Going forward would be tough. It now meant seeking funding from agencies who support the work that

you do or it meant doing the work that the funders would fund and somehow make the work that you do and the funds that they have available work for your organization. Literally this mean a paradigm shift in



focus. Time to get writing! Time to do some resource mobilization. We needed to set the federation on its own path. We needed to give it its own personality.

Give it a past, present and a future. There were some volunteers who were instrumental in this transition, Sylvie Lamothe worked with the team at WestFed to strategize the way forward to include the set up if our website most importantly and training in the area of resource mobilization. Also important was our social media presence as an individual organization standing on our own to feet.

We then needed to start writing. A process which is very time consuming and competitive. Many times we are seeking funding from a pool sought after by the entire Caribbean. We have however been very successful with our attempts and have had successfully received increasingly larger projects. Our goal is to continue to seek funds that will allow us to cover a wide range of

areas that will bring an improvement in the lives of persons and bring healing therapy in the lives of those who needs it.纷


It needs to form part of their new normal. The way they live their lives need to be guided by the principles of what the goals set out to achieve. How can the federation play a role in letting this become a reality?

Canadían Fund For Local Inítiatives— Empowering Women and Girls









his project was implemented mainly to Empower students and persons in communities to have greater awareness of what their rights are as it relates to their sexuality, their basic human rights and rights



to their bodies as it relates to abuse against women and girls. It also sought to give them a sense of empowerment in dealing with and standing up to their abusers.

The project sought to conduct educational sessions with students during school hours so as to maximize the reach of the program and conduct community sessions out of working hours to allow parents to be able to appreciate the information that was being shared with the children. It sought to



strengthen the knowledge that the students have on sexual reproductive health and illnesses (STIs and STDs) that can result if they are not mindful of their sexual interactions.

It sought to promote the work of all stakeholders involved in



the project like the Dominica Planned Parenthood Association and the National HIV Aids Response Unit of Dominica. By working with these organizations, children will be aware of resources that are available to them. They will be able to make better lifestyle choices due to an increased awareness of the repercussion of their actions in cases of

promiscuity.



Staff of these two organizations were responsible for the components of sexual reproductive Health information as it relates to Sexually Transmitted Diseases. Dominica Parent Planned Hood Association also

contributed to components including sexuality and sexual reproductive Health. We thank Nurse Julie Frampton of Women Helping Other Women (WHOW) and Delia Cuffy Weekes for facilitation of empowerment sessions. By doing this

project and sharing this information we hope that

Representatives of the Canadian Fund for Local Initiatives had the chance to come to the field to meet with some of the recipients of the tanks. It was a joy for the federation to show the funding agency the work that was

o reduce women's vulnerability L to water shortage following a natural disaster" This is what we set out to do in the above project. We saw the need to conduct training in the safe storage, treatment and use of harvested rain water for recipients of water storage tanks. We purchased and installed the water storage tanks for the selected women headed households for use during water shortages and after disasters. Many of these women are unemployed, single, or underemployed and are heads of their households with several children and sometimes extended family and home bound elderly to support. Having enough good quality water is a problem. This is not a problem that was being addressed directly and that was an ideal area for our support. The project had a positive impact on the environment as it harvests rainwater



sustainably for use by households who would otherwise have to trek long distances to carry water from general stand pipes or rivers close by. Because of the remote location of these two communities. Gallion and Campbell, up in the mountains, this was particularly helpful to the families. The project will have very little negative impact on the environment as the dimensions of water tanks are not very big and can be located close to households. The installation requires no clearing of lands so therefore does not require the use of hazardous materials.



A recipient of one of the 250 gallon water tanks distributed by the federation under this project. The mother with her children will no doubt fully utilize the tank in the community due to the water shortage issues. Harvesting of rain water is not only a cheap alternative but also what is best in terms of climate adaptation practices for the future.

Being a resilient nation does not come solely from surviving a catastrophic event, but also from taking the necessary steps to over come the disaster and better prepare for the future, making sure that history does not repeat itself.

There are various ways of preparing for a disaster which include physical and psychological. We need to take a wholesome approach to being prepared by educating ourselves about the risks, and how we can mitigate against the risks but also how we can adapt to the impacts of climate change.

The federation would like to see a community where all children are well aware of what they need to do to be prepared at all levels. There is work to be done on the physical which include their home surrounding. But also the work to be done on the psychological level also. There needs to be a culture of preparedness and of adapting our lifestyles to the new normal of unpredictability and of recovery after a disaster being as fast and as smooth as possible without too much death and destruction.

We need to prepare our children by educating them about the impacts and how they



can work with them. This work needs to start now.s





Reduce Reuse Recycle is heard all year round but how seriously are we really taking this whole action and drive? Do we truly understand what a difference it can make to our planet? Are we seeing improvements in our surrounding. We need to continue any positive action that we have taken and continue to encourage others to take the same positive actions that can make a difference.

The María Holder Memoríal Trust— Sustaínable Lívelíhoods

In the post Maria era where hundreds of people lost not only their homes (over 90% of home were damaged or destroyed

due to the Hurricane) but also their jobs because of severe damage to businesses and rampant looting.

Many businesses could not afford to continue to employ people, many were laid off. Also, many persons who were selfemployed and had small businesses of their own lost all their assets and are unable to restart their business because they were not able to afford insurance, have limited or no savings and are heavily indebted to banks and other financial institutions. Thus they are unable to recapitalize immediately recommence to business activities.

Additionally, many of the people who lost their jobs were the heads of their household. Single women with children and other dependents such as elderly parents and other extended family members to support. In order for

persons to be workforce ready or to be able to employ themselves they must be retrained and retooled to attract employers or to create entrepreneurial

opportunities for themselves and their families. This project will seek to retrain

> and retool women and youth in skills

which allow them to regain their ability to earn

a living and thus be able to support their families and those dependent upon them. Giving youth the skills they need to be employable or to employ themselves helps their self esteem



and makes them more productive members of society. This is of particular importance generally as employment in itself could lead to a boost in self-esteem which could improve the family structure and potentially abate abusive behaviour towards women and children.

For many people Climate change and its impacts has not been at the forefront of their decision making in their daily lives. For example, many people choose to build homes in close proximity or on the river beds and

close to seashore even after this has been restricted by the Governments Planning Division. As a children's organization, advocacy the West Federation is saddened when children's lives are put at risk by so doing. This awareness campaign is meant to

educate people about best practises as it relates to Climate Change response before, during and after a disaster and educate them on the impact of climate change on their livelihoods.



There is a joy that Ms. Kimberly Francis gets from participating in disaster preparedness activities and equipping herself to help her community in times of a disaster. She is a trained CERT person, First Aid assistant and she also did the Ham Radio training along with her son. She can therefore lead and participate in both the disaster preparedness and recovery in her village!

The carnival band was an idea borne out of a need to come up with ideas that are recentive to need to come up with ideas that are receptive to children and youth whilst teaching them to fight Under this project we against climate change. engaged six different schools from varied communities and so we thought if these children who participated in the project would become good ambassadors for action against the impacts of climate change then we would have a good start towards taking positive action. The actions has to be organized and it has to be consistent and in order to achieve this the children and youth have to be taught to organize themselves into good strong



action oriented groups who have clear visions as to what needs to be achieved when tackling the impacts of climate change.



Therefore Group Dynamics formed part of the training that we offered under the project funded by the UNDP GEF Small Grants program. There needs to be continued efforts towards keeping these groups focused and motivated because the impacts of climate change is not short term and it has many compounding issues along with it that puts Dominica at risk constantly. Strong Groups are needed for consistent action against climate change.

Stamp Your Hand to Stamp Out Abuse–

Our signature event which we are know for taking a stance against all forms of abuse. Persons from all strata of society roll up their sleeves to dip their hand in washable paint to stamp it on paper in an effort to make their personal statement to show support to the victims of abusers. The court system has been wanting in its bid to give satisfaction to many victims. It has proven to be a frustrating and inconvenient process especially to children who



have been abused. A high number of cases get shut down prematurely because the young child has gone years of showing up to court without getting their case heard and often when it is heard the sentencing is not at a standard that signal

the punitive element that it should. The court system needs to be more amenable and sympathetic to the abused. Though there has been much talk about new laws coming into effect, unless a more judicious court system that takes the plight of the abused into consideration there will still be a system that



frustrates the persons who come to court looking for some justice. Until there is a court that treats the abused with more dignity and does not allow children to sit across from their abuser who may be



intimidating to them there will be a large number of cases that does not receive justice. What this can do to the mind of the abused is far reaching and could be avoided if we had a more well balanced and judicious court system.



Today, with great joy, I congratulate the past and present staff, board members and beneficiaries of the West Dominica Children's Federation on their 10 years anniversary!. I know first hand that this organization has a

passion for helping children and families thrive.

The staff are dedicated to making a meaningful difference in reducing inequalities and violations that hinder children and families from realizing their dreams. Much work and many hurdles were overcome to smoothly refine and enhance the West Dominica Children's Federation over the years in order to ensure a smooth transition and a strong foothold in the void that could have been left by the exit of ChildFund.
